CALL TO ORDER	Chair Gilbert called the meeting to order at 8:08 a.m.
NEW TRUSTEE APPOINTMENT	Chair Gilbert introduced the Board's newest Trustee, Charles Epstein.
RULES OF ORDER SUSPENDED	Chair Gilbert suspended agenda items 3, 4, 5 and 6, to allow enough time for Liz Murphy (Consultant, CampusWorks), and two students, to present to the Board. The rules of order to resume afterwards.
PRESIDENT'S REPORT	Adult Learners:
	Pathways Coordinator Irma Medina introduced Matthew Medina. At 21 years of age, and homeless living behind a jewelry store, Matthew (no relation to Irma) began his academic career at Springfield Technical Community College (STCC). While studying Network Security, Matthew began taking honors courses. A professor and mentor at STCC advised Matthew to transfer to HCC so he could utilize the College's partnerships with private elite institutions. Now at 24 years of age attending HCC and in his final semester, Matthew is a semi-finalist for the Jack Kent Cook Transfer Scholarship. With the help of Irma Medina and various transfer advisors from different colleges, Matthew is working with the College Board to establish waivers for community college students who have not taken the SAT. The waivers would make it easier for community college students to transfer to elite schools that have yet to accept such waivers.

Vice President for Business & Community Services (BCS) Jeff Hayden introduced Carl King. Not only is Carl a student, he is also a lab technician for BCS and Workforce Development. Carl, a military veteran of 14 years is studying Culinary Arts. Carl trained in culinary while in the military, as well as Putnam Vocational High School. Working in the culinary industry, Carl felt he was passed over for promotions, and the money that they bring, because he lacked the necessary credentials. Therefore, he decided he needed to do something. Through Workforce Development, Carl took non-credit courses to earn his Serve Safe and OSHA-10 certifications. After discussions with Assistant Vice President of ABE & Workforce Development Kermit Dunkelberg, Carl decided to attend HCC fulltime. Carl finished his first fulltime semester (Fall 2017) with a 3.2 grade point average. Carl's future plans include working at the MGM Springfield Casino, and ultimately returning to HCC as an instructor.

On a motion by Trustee Johnson and seconded by Trustee Hebert, it was **VOTED** to empower the President of the College to approve all personnel actions prior to the next meeting.

# REPORT OF THE FINANCE COMMITTEE

Report of the Finance Committee presented by Comptroller Marcia Mitchell and Vice President for Administration & Finance Bill Fogarty:

- As of 6 months, revenues are currently 2% unfavorable to the prior year and expenses are 2% favorable. The college is currently even.
- As usual, compared to budget, at 6 months we're usually between 65-70% of our revenues because we start collecting revenues for the second semester (spring). We are currently at 48%.
- Chair Gilbert stated that while dealing with a decrease in enrollment, Marcia and Bill are doing a good job of controlling expenses.
- The CFO's of all of the Mass. Community Colleges agree that the current financial model is not sustainable. As the Board looks at the strategic planning process they should keep in mind that the college is looking at revamping its current business and financial model.

On a motion by Trustee Vidal and seconded by Trustee Plotkin, it was **VOTED** to approve the Second Quarterly Statement of Revenue and Expenses for FY 2018 as presented.

- Chair Gilbert, Trustee Epstein, Trustee Hebert, Trustee Epstein, Trustee Vidal, and President Royal are attending the Statewide Trustees Conference on 3/1.

President Royal welcomed the College's new Affirmative Action Officer/Title IX Coordinator Nick D'Agostino.

#### Strategic Planning Update:

The Trustees present were given an updated Strategic Planning Calendar of Activities (see handout). Several events that were cancelled due to snow were rescheduled. Prior to submitting the Strategic Plan (SP), the college will conduct a couple of key Touch Points with the state. The SP is individualized for HCC however the touch points provide discussion opportunities with the state to ensure that state priorities are taken into account in the SP as well. Board of Trustees to approve a recommendation of a SP that would go to the Department of Higher Education for approval after Touch Point 2. The state will vote on the plan in the Fall (October perhaps).

<u>Business & Community Services Annual Report</u>: presented by Vice President for Business & Community Services (BCS) Jeff Hayden, and Dean of Community Service Ken White.

**Subject:** FY19 Fee Proposal

In considering fee increases, we take into account affordability, consistency, and the College's needs. Additionally, we consider whether or not there have been recent increases to the fees we consider adjusting. The college's Educational Services Fee (ESF) is its main source of revenue (other than the State Appropriation) and is generally adjusted annually. We also consider the impact of adjusting fees that are charged per credit, versus fees that are charged per semester.

Issues with the Foundations of Health Fee, a per-student per-semester charge of \$100 have been brought to our attention. This fee was developed and assessed when it was believed that most of the program would take place at the newly-opened Center for Health Education (CHE). In actuality, students enrolled in this program only take one course at the CHE, leading them and their families to question why they are being charged this fee. We are recommending elimination of this fee, an impact of approximately \$150,000 per year, and will need to compensate for this loss of revenue. After consideration of the impact of adjusting other fees, we have decided to recommend an additional increase to the ESF, given that Foundations of Health is one of our largest enrolled programs.

The impact to students taking 15 credit hours (no fully-online classes) would be \$150 per semester (\$9/credit ESF and \$1/credit Facilities Fee). Each fully-online, 3-credit class would add \$15 to this increase.

Recommended motion: Move that the Board of Trustees eliminate the \$100 per student per semester Foundations of Health program fee, effective 7/1/18.

Recommended motion: Move that the Board of Trustees approve to increase the Educational Services Fee from \$155 to \$164 per credit; increase the Facilities Fee from \$4 to \$5 per semester; increase the Distance Learning Fee from \$15 to \$20 per credit.
