FINANCE COMMITTEE REPORT

Third Quarter Statement of Revenue and Expenses report provided by Curt Foster, Comptroller covering the period of July 1, 2019 through March 31, 2020.

- Financial Highlights Overall, total revenue through the third quarter is 3.2% unfavorable to prior year and total expense is 3.6% favorable compared to prior year. Total revenue as a percent of the full year budget is 82.5% and total expense is 70.6%.
- Tuition and Fee (T&F) revenue is 6.36% unfavorable compared to the prior year.
- The FY20 T&F budget is 3% lower than prior year. Based on the third quarter T&F decline compared to last year, we are currently projecting T&F revenue to shortfall budget by \$1.9 million.
- State Appropriation reflects an increase of .64%. Our unrestricted state appropriation is at budgeted \$30,067,260. This includes state paid fringe benefits not previously budgeted, but, reported on our annual financial statements.
- Private gifts and grants revenue and expense are not reflected in this report. Grant activity in the third quarter year to date is lower at \$18.1 million compared to \$20.1 million.
- Investment revenue is not reflected in this report. Investment losses for the third quarter totaled \$2.0M.
- Business and Community Services revenue is unfavorable to the prior year by 11.93% distributed across all categories. Revenue is currently at 72.5% of budget. Currently, we are projecting a \$346.5K shortfall to budget.
- Administrative Allowance revenue which is derived from indirect cost recovery from grant activity is favorable to prior year by 55.26%.
- Auxiliary enterprises revenue (bookstore) is unfavorable to last year due to disruptions caused by the delay in privatizing the bookstore. We are projecting full year revenue to be \$168,375 or \$26,125 unfavorable compared to budget.
- Compensation and Benefit expense is 1.37% favorable to the prior year and is tracking as a percent of budget at 76.07%. Our current forecast is \$733K over budget that is offset by \$950K in additional state funding for contractual increases.
- Supplies and Services is 10.54% favorable to prior year and is tracking at a rate of 52% of the full year budget. We pursued reducing or delaying expenses to fully offset the remaining revenue

shortfall by \$2.8 million after the second quarter, however expenses related to the COVOD-19 pandemic, currently estimated at \$600,000, and may impact this reduction in the full year budget.

- Scholarship and Fellowship expenditure is favorable by 10.94%.
- Auxiliary enterprises expenditure (bookstore) is favorable by 46.89% compared to last year largely due to retirements of two long time employees and privatization of the bookstore.

<u>Bylaws & Governance Committee Report provided by Trustee Gilbert</u> No update to report as the Committee has not met.

<u>Equity Committee Report provided by Trustee Friedrick & Trustee Johnson</u> Trustee Johnson stated that she will be meeting with President Royal to outline the next steps for the Equity Committee.

Nominating Committee report provided by Trustee Johnson

Trustee Johnson reminded the Board that June will be Trustee Friedrick last meeting. The new elected Student Trustee's term is effective July 1, 2020 – June 30, 2021.

Presidential Evaluation Committee Chaired by Trustee Pokela

Trustee Pokela informed Trustees that there are four major components to President Royal's evaluation. Every three to five years the State requires us to do a more comprehensive in-depth evaluation of the President. This year due to the current pandemic, the State has extended the deadline to submit the President's Evaluation to the fall.

Strategic Plan Committee Report provided by Trustee Plotkin

President Royal informed the Board that with the departure of Dr. Kathryn Senie who led the Strategic Plan work, these responsibilities will now be assumed by the Director of Planning and Curriculum Assessment. There is currently a search underway to fill this position.

In addition to attending various zoom meetings and telephone calls, Chair REPORT OF THE CHAIR Gilbert participated in: April 28th – Town Hall Meeting for the Class of 2020 April 30th – Town Hall Meeting for Students Regarding the CARES May 12th – Met with President Royal to set the agenda for today's meeting. May 20th – Professional Association Meeting PRESIDENT'S REPORT President Royal provided the following updates: The first disbursement of the CARES Act funding was given in a block grant in the amount of a \$350 to approximately 2300 students. There is also the application process for students who did not qualify for the CARES Act funding to apply for financial assistance from the President's Emergency Student Fund. The revisions to the fall schedule have been made since the announcement that the college will be going remote for the fall semester. We are currently tracking our summer and fall enrollment numbers and adopting new marketing initiatives. We are working on prioritizing the repopulation of the campus. President Royal reminded the Board that we did not physically close but restricted physical access to campus. Cabinet members along with the Emergency Management Team are working on creating a draft of our reopening plan that aligns with the states requirements. A decision was made to hold a virtual commencement on Thursday, August 20th at noon for the Class of 2020. These students will have the opportunity to walk across the stage during the Class of 2021 Commencement Ceremony on June 5, 2021.

 President Royal congratulated Amanda Sbriscia on her 40 Under 40 Class of 2020 recognition.
