IV. Audit and Finance Committee Report

Vice President Sampath explained that the Quarterly Review of Revenue and Expenses information were in the Board packet and no one had any questions.

Vice President Sampath went on to explain the Student Fee Proposal motion. As background, Vice President Sampath did met with the Student Senate, the Budget Advisory Committee and the Audit & Finance Committee, who approved the recommendation to the Board. Slide presentation (see attached).

There was a discussion about the impact of the wraparound services provided by the College, and the availability of scholarship opportunities to soften the impact of a fee increase.

V. Committee Rports

- A. Equity Committee Trustee Johnson provided an update on the Retreat that took place on Monday, March 25, 2024 with several Foundation Board members, and speaker, Rachel Rall. The time was used to explore and dig deeper into the role as trustees, and how we can advance and support the equity work on behalf of students. There was further discussion among the trustees who attended the retreat.
- B. Bylaws and Governance Committee Trustee Vidal reminded the Board of the Committee's work on the Trustee Handbook for new trustees that will include a mission statement from each sub-committee and the goals we want to accomplish in the next year. She envisions an college liaison person for each committee to ensure the work is being as intentional as possible.
- C. Nominating Committee Interim Chair Smith updated the Board on the work of nominating potential trusteees for current vacant positions and for those positions who are expried terms. The Committee will be developing a matrix of competencies for each Board member. Interim Chair Smith will be scheduling the Presidential Evaluation Committee to meet to begin that work shortly.

VI. Report of the Interim Chair

Interim Chair Smith updated the Board about her continued meetings with President Timmons. In addition, she attended meetings with the Commissioner's Office about presidential evaluations and trustee nominations, and that work continues. The goal is to meet with recommended individuals and assess their understanding of the mission, vision and values, as well as gauge their interest in serving on our Board.

VII. President's Report

A. President Timmons updated the Board on a meeting with Chancellor Reyes of the Unversity of Massachusetts in Amherst. We discussed bringing our teams together to explore ways to increase the success of our Hispanic and Lantix students.

President Timmons has been asked to serve on Governor Healey's AI (artitical intelligence) Taskforce, specifically, the Education Sector Working Group. The Group is tasked with studying and providing recommendations for the state that can best support businesses in leading sectors around AI adoption.

President Timmons has been nominated and approved to serve on the Holyoke Medical Center Board.

A team from HCC will be traveling later today to Cooley Dickinson Hospital to meet with Dr. Lynette Watkins and her team to discuss ways we can enhance our partnership and meet the workforce needs of the area.

In early March, the College hosted CEO Megan Burke and the Western Massachusetts Community Foundation and elected officials to learn more about the Foundations role in supporting constituents through scholarships, non-profit grants and leveraging funding for the community.

This past weekend, Dr. Rebecca Townsend, and two students – William Diaz and Sunrise Smith – partiicpated in the Stavros Niarchos Foundation Ithaca national Student Dialogue hosted by the University of Deleware, Biden School of Public Policy.

President Timmons congratulated Dr. Sharale Mathis on her recent recognition by the Connecticut American Council on Education Women's Network. She was selected for the 2024 Distinguished Woman in Higher Education Leadership Award. President Timmons also congratuted Dr. Camile Close on her recent appointment to the Board of the American Council on Education Women's Network in Connecticut.

The College has made arrangemetns for a tour and lunch on Wednesday, April 10, 2024 with a focus on the renovation of the Animal Sciences and Veterinary Technician program. This is part of the College's efforts to fundraise for the Marieb building.

SUBJECT: Second Quarter Statement of Revenues and Expenses (FY 2024)

Attached is the second quarter statement of revenues and expenses for both our state maintenance appropriation and college trust funds covering the period October 1, 2023 through December 31, 2023. I hereby certify that to the best of knowledge and belief all funds expended were in compliance with the rules and regulations for trust funds and state finance law.

Financial Highlights - Overall, total revenues are 14.4% favorable (up \$4,296,629) and total expenses are 14.2% unfavorable (up \$3,503,215) compared to the same period in the prior year. The revenue increase is due to an increase in State Appropriations and Tuition and Fees revenue. Compared to the prior Fall 2022, current Fall 2023 headcount and FTE is currently up 4.4% and 5.1%, respectively.

Tuition and Fee (T&F) revenue is 10.4% or \$1,383,747 favorable compared to the prior year for the second quarter. In addition to the enrollment increase, the per credit fee increase of \$10 per credit hour contributed to the favorable results. The FY24 T&F budget is \$14,061,182; \$118,575 or less than 1%lower than prior year. Tuition and fee revenue is projected to exceed budget for the full year FY24 by \$1 million.

State Unrestricted Appropriation reflects an increase of 21.43% or \$3,351,869. State appropriation is budgeted at \$35,049,142. We received increased funding from the state due to fund the collective bargaining agreements for MCCC and AFSCME staff.

Gifts, Grants and Contract revenue is unbudgeted and not reflected in the Statement of Revenues and Expenses. Revenue for the first quarter year to date is \$7,896,413.16 or \$454,548 lower than prior year.

Investment gains and losses are not reported in the Statement of Revenues and Expenses. Investment results for the second quarter year to day was a gain \$784,168 net of the first quarter loss of \$479,592.

Business and Community Services revenue is unfavorable to the prior year by \$206,576 or 48.7%. The unfavorable results are primarily due to the timing of Gateway to College payments, decreased non-credit fee revenue and the discontinuation of the Training and Workforce Options agreement. Revenue is currently at 13.6% of budget.

Administrative Allowance revenue which is derived from indirect cost recovery from grant activity is unfavorable to prior year by \$198,560 or 51.6%. This is due to timing and the full year is projected to meet budget.

Auxiliary enterprises revenue (bookstore) is unfavorable to the prior year, decreasing \$33,851 or 100%. This is due to the expiration of Barnes & Noble guaranteed commissions. Bookstore revenue is not budgeted in FY24. The college has recently completed a bid process for the College Store, awarding the bid and executing a new contract with eCampus.com. eCampus.com is an online bookstore and will also have a limited presence on the campus.

Compensation and Benefit expense is 18.57 % or \$3,491,685 unfavorable to the prior year. This is primarily due to an increase in vacation and sick leave payouts, supplemental payments to employees, and salary increases for non-unit professional staff and as well as collective bargaining agreements for MCCC and AFSCME staff. Higher

fringe benefit and payroll tax rates in FY24 also contributes to the increased expense. Second quarter results are coming in at 56.48% of budget.

Supplies and Services is .2% or \$10,568 unfavorable to prior year and is tracking at 49.15% of budget. This increase is primarily due to a rise in facilities infrastructure projects, travel, and utility costs but is offset by a reduction in consulting services for temporary employees and ITD professionals. The college is expecting to be reimbursed \$799,000 from the state for expenses related to the South Plaza project.

Scholarship and Fellowship expenditure is favorable by .33% or \$1,118 due to timing of Gateway to College scholarships in the second quarter. We anticipate this expense to be on budget for the full year.

Recommended Motion: Move that the Finance Committee recommend to the Board of Trustees to approve the Second Quarter Statement of Revenue and Expenses as presented.

Fiscal Year 2025 Fees (July 2024 to June 2025) Board of Trustees, March 26, 2024








- Fee set by the State: \$24 per credit

Fiscal Year 2025 Outlook

- State revenues below target for the fiscal year
- Expect payroll to increase by about \$2.5M depending how many positions we are able to fill/vacancies.
- We expect a nominal increase from the State appropriations to cover the increases but it typically does not cover all the increases
- An increase of \$4 million to MassReconnect, from \$20 million to \$24 million
- An increase of \$75 million in higher ed capital funding, from \$50 million to \$125 million
- SUCCESS is level funded at \$14 million
- Decrease to performance-based funding formula (Down to about 1%. HCC impact is about \$750K)
- Impact of Mass Reconnect and "Free Community College for all"
 - Increased enrollment
 - Increased need for college to provide support

Recommendation:

We propose an increase in the educational service fee by \$7 to \$213 per credit and a \$5 increase in the Student Service Fee per semester to \$150, which will result in an increase of \$68 per semester for someone who takes 7 credits, \$113 for someone who takes 12 credits and \$140 for someone who takes 15 credits.
