Ubuntu Arts Community integrates inter-generational mentoring, the arts, leadership development, social justice and community building. We do this through building caring relationships, creativity and having fun. The children also receive academic support from high school and college mentors.

Meeting three days a week after school, Ubuntu brings together children, ages 6 -12 years old at Rebecca M. Johnson School in Springfield, with high school students and college mentors. We begin with snacks and free time, and then gather in our Opening Community Circle. Then the group participates in a variety of activities. Ubuntu gems take workshops in art, music, dance, yoga, martial arts, drumming, storytelling, and poetry, play board games, talk, and receive homework support.

Ubuntu *gems*, First Generation members, and families come together for Family and Community Celebrations three to four times a year. Family and Community Celebrations invite families and the community-at-large to enjoy live music, food, and experience the dance, theater, writing and visual art that Ubuntu gems and community artists have created.

The caring relationships that First Generation and college mentors build with our Ubuntu gems is the foundation of Ubuntu. To lay the building blocks for a successful mentoring network, First Generation members receive ongoing training in empathic listening and communication, conflict de-escalation, gender equity, understanding the socialization of boys and hyper-masculinity, leadership styles and group facilitation.
