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Facilities Condition Assessment

The Division of Capital Asset Management and Maintenance (DCAMM) engaged Cannon FOS to conduct a facility condition assessment (FCA) for all state-owned major buildings and grounds occupied by the nine (9) state universities and specialty colleges and the fifteen (15) community colleges.

The purpose of the FCA was to update information that enables sound capital asset management practices. The goals of the FCA are to gather and systemically catalog updated information about existing facility conditions (including basic building portfolio information), prioritize the data and provide estimate construction costs (ECC). A ten-year planning horizon was used for this assessment.

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Summary

The following summary analysis is to answer the four fundamental questions underlying an objective assessment: what is owned (Current Replacement Value); what is the current-state condition (Facility Condition Index); what are the estimated direct cost (trade), estimated construction cost (ECC) and project costs to maintain (Funding Needs); and how to strategically plan for the future needs (Priority Planning).

This report is based on our field assessments, interviews with client staff, our professional opinions and comparative analysis of assessment items within our expansive facility condition assessment database. The following is a summary of our findings and recommendations.

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



REPORT OF THE CHAIR	 Chair Gilbert highlighted his work with the College over the last month: He continues to meet with President Timmons weekly to discuss college business, and has now invited Vice Chair Smith to join them in the discussion. He attended an Executive Session of the Board on September 28, 2023. He attended the Audit and Finance Committee meeting on October 10, 2023. He attended the special meeting with Secretary Tutwiler at the Center for Health Education as part of STEM week and the announcement of free community college for our nursing students. He attended the Board Equity Training, along with members of the Leadership Team on Institutional and Systemic Racism. He asked the Committee Chairs to send in their goals for each committee as soon as possible. He encouraged members of the Board to be visible on campus as much as possible.
PRESIDENT'S REPORT:	 President Timmons provided the following update: With members of the Cabinet, attended dinner on Sunday night with guests from the New England Commission of Higher Education (NECHE). The purpose of the visit is to verify information submitted in the Focused Evaluation Report over the summer. Special thanks were extended to Dr. Sharale Mathis, Kris Ricker Choleva and Dr. Veena Dhankher. On October 17th, the College had the honor of hosting members of the Healy-Driscoll administration, the Secretary of Education, Patrick Tutwiler, Secretary of Labor and Workforce, Lauren Jones and other dignitaries. As part of the visit, they toured the Center for Education and announced the \$18 million scholarship that will allow currently enrolled nursing students to attend community for free. Special thanks were extended to Dr. Amanda Sbriscia and Karen Desjeans. The HCC Team met with Baystate Health leadership to discuss innovative ways to enhance the partnership. We will continue with small group conversations focusing on specific initiatives. Has accepted the call to serve on the Search Committee for the new CEO/President of the MassHire Hampden County Workforce Board. Met with the community college presidents and representatives from MACC with the Smith Family and Accelerate the Future Foundations to discuss an interest in a state-wide approached to embedding credit work-based learning into associate degrees. The College received an additional \$100,000 for Education and Training programming from the Supplemental Budget requests, managed by the

MACC office. Acknowledged the accolades of several community members: o Professor Nicole Henderson-Hendricks was honored with an Inspiration Award from the African American Female Professor Award Association. o Professor Sage Franetovich and her students, in collaboration with faculty and students from Smith College, were highlighted in the October 13the edition of MassLive for their service learning work in the City of Holyoke regarding Urban Forrest Project. o Media Relations Manager, Chris Yurko, is one of three finalists for an NCMPR District 1 Medallion Award in the Short Form Writing category. 
